# **Medicine Supply Alert Notice**

Sterculia (Normacol®) 62% w/w granules Sterculia & Frangula Bark (Normacol Plus®) 62%/ 8% w/w granules

Priority: Level 2\* - update to MSAN (2020)93

Valid until: late October 2020

#### Issue

- 1. Normacol<sup>®</sup> and Normacol Plus<sup>®</sup> granules are out of stock until late October 2020.
- 2. Unlicensed imports of Sterculia 62% w/w granules and Sterculia 62% w/w with Frangula Bark 8% w/w can be sourced.
- 3. UKMi have provided clinical advice on switching to alternative preparations.

#### **Advice and Actions**

- 4. Where patients have insufficient supplies to last until the re-supply date, clinicians should:
  - review if treatment is still required;
  - consider switching to alternative preparations (see supporting information below); or
  - consider prescribing unlicensed imports, if alternative preparations are not considered appropriate. Prescribers should work with local pharmacy teams to ensure orders are placed within appropriate time frames as lead times may vary (see additional information below).

Table 1: Alternatives to Normacol® and Normacol Plus® granules

Product	Container	Dosage	Alternative oral preparation
Normacol® (sterculia) granules	Sachets or lined box of granules	1 or 2 sachets or 1-2 heaped 5ml spoonfuls, once or twice daily after meals.	Ispaghula husk* ( one sachet up to twice a day)
Normacol Plus <sup>®</sup> (sterculia / frangula) granules	Sachets or lined box of granules	1 or 2 sachets or 1-2 heaped 5ml spoonfuls, once or twice daily after meals.	Ispaghula husk* (one sachet up to twice a day) with stimulant, e.g. senna (7.5mg – 15mg) at night or bisacodyl (5mg-20mg) tablets.

<sup>\*</sup>if ispaghula products are not suitable/tolerated, methylcellulose is an alternative bulk-forming laxative

5. Due to the aspartame content, ispaghula products are not suitable for patients with phenylketonuria.

- Due to maltitol content, senna syrup is not suitable for patients with hereditary problems of fructose intolerance.
