Medicine Supply Alert Notice

Levobunolol (Betagan[®]) 0.5% eye drops 0.4ml unit dose preservative free

Priority: Level 2^{*} Valid until: product is being discontinued

Issue

- 1. Levobunolol (Betagan[®]) 0.5% eye drops 0.4ml unit dose preservative free are being discontinued from late December 2024.
- 2. Alternative preservative free, single dose beta-blocker eye drops remain available and are able to support the market.

Advice and Actions

- 3. Clinicians should identify patients prescribed levobunolol (Betagan[®]) 0.5% eye drops 0.4ml unit dose preservative free and consider:
 - prescribing timolol (Tiopex[®]) 1mg/g eye gel drops 0.4g unit dose preservative free or betaxolol (Betoptic[®]) 0.25% eye drops 0.25ml unit dose preservative free, ensuring that the patient is not intolerant to any of the excipients and is counselled on any changes in preparation, dose and frequency (see additional information below); or
 - if the above options are not considered appropriate, advice should be sought from specialists on management options.

Clinical Information

- 4. The preservative free (single/unit dose) eye drops containing the beta blockers levobunolol (Betagan[®]), timolol (Tiopex[®]), and betaxolol (Betoptic[®]) are licensed for treatment of chronic open-angle glaucoma and ocular hypertension.
- 5. Dose frequency varies between preparations:
 - Levobunolol (Betagan[®]) 0.5% eye drops (0.4ml unit dose) are administered once or twice daily.
 - Timolol (Tiopex[®]) 1mg/g eye gel (0.4g unit dose) is administered once daily, in the morning.
 - Betaxolol (Betoptic[®]) 0.25% eye drops (0.25ml single dose) are administered twice daily.
