Medicine Supply Alert Notice

Tuberculosis (TB) oral medicines

Priority: Level 2*

Valid until: various resupply dates – see below

Issue

- 1. A number of fixed combination TB medicines are currently experiencing supply issues.
- For detailed information on stock availability, suggested management plans, and expected resupply dates for the affected products, please refer to the table in the 'Additional Information' section.

Advice and Actions

- 3. Pharmacy procurement teams and clinical teams (including prescribers and TB nurses) should work together to ensure that:
 - stock holdings of TB medicines are reviewed regularly;
 - alternatives, as advised in the summary table, are ordered for TB medicines in short supply;
 - prescriptions are amended when the usual/preferred TB medicine is unavailable to avoid delays or interruptions in treatment;
 - prescriptions for impacted TB medicines are limited to a maximum of one month's supply to preserve supplies as long as possible;
 - Health Boards should facilitate mutual aid if required;
 - management plans that are not in line with the advice in this document are not implemented, as they may lead to further stockouts;
 - people are appropriately counselled about changes to their usual or expected medication;
 and
 - multi-language patient-facing communications are provided where appropriate, ensuring people are informed of any medication changes;

- 4. The World Health Organization recommends fixed dose combination tablets over separate drugs, particularly in people with HIV co-infection to reduce pill burden and improve adherence. Switching from fixed dose combinations to prescribing the individual components is not recommended due to risk of inadvertent dosing errors, poor adherence and treatment failure.
- 5. To reduce risks of unintended consequences, it is important that, where possible, fixed dose combination alternatives are prescribed to support management of affected patients
